Raisin recipe relieves arthritis

If you suffer from arthritis, give this unusual concoction a try. It comes from Lois Loehrke and was published in the St. Lucas Lutheran Church newsletter, Toledo, Ohio. The recipe stems from early history when the people of India and Egypt discovered the healing properties of juniper berries – gin comes from natural grains and juniper berries. Even if you are on medication that advises against alcohol, most of the alcohol in the nine raisins eaten daily would have evaporated, so the small amount remaining would be insignificant.

- **1.** Empty one box of golden (light) raisins into a shallow container.
- 2. Pour enough gin to completely cover the raisins.
- **3.** Let stand uncovered until all liquid disappears (about seven days). Stirring occasionally helps the evaporation process.
- **4.** Place raisins in a covered container and eat just nine raisins a day. If you don't like raisins, put them in cereal or a salad.

Judge Nancy Loving is dedicated, versatile vet



Recently, I agreed to become the first Region III trails advocate. I am very happy that our board chose to establish this position and am glad to fill it.

Let me tell you why I think it is important for our sport to become actively involved in working for trails.

Everyone who puts on a ride or who rides on trails will tell you we are losing trails. Statistics tell us that nationally, we are losing four percent of our open space annually to development. That's a pretty abstract statement. It becomes much more personal when you go out to ride and find new fences and locked gates that prevent you from using trails you've enjoyed for years. Or someone yells at you for trespassing on their property. Or the trees, flowers and wildlife you've seen along the way are replaced by subdivisions and litter and your horse goes berserk when a kid on. a skateboard zips past you. Sound like something you've experienced?

We can't reverse this trend without hard work. Horse people by nature aren't "joiners." We just want to ride our horses. The Quarter people and the Arab people and the dressage riders and the ropers all tend to ignore each other and go their own way. But we all love horses. If we don't become politically active, we will lose out on trails, zoning issues, taxes and so on. We need to let people know by words and actions that we want trails, that we respect the environment and that we're willing to do our share to make our desires become reality. We can do this by working with other trail users - bicyclists, hikers, joggers - to create and maintain trails. We can cooperate and be gracious about sharing trails. We can recognize that horses do cause damage and do our part to minimize that damage. We can ride responsibly and help keep liability costs down.

I want to be Region III's official trail representative, but every one of us must be a positive representative for our sport and for equestrian trails every day. - Judi Tobias

Region III renewal/newsletter subscription

If you haven't renewed your Region III membership, the cutoff date for receiving the Region 3 Newsletter will be June 1 of the same year. National members will only receive two complementary newsletters until they join Region III.

Eligibility for Region III year-end awards
All national NATRC members who are dues-paying members to Region III NATRC are eligible for regional placings and awards.
Requirements: Open horses and riders must enter three (3) rides per season and accumulate a minimum of 30 points to be eligible for year-end placings. Open horses and riders will be eligible for the Ruth Tyree High Average Horsemanship and Ken Burkdoll Combined High Average Horse-Rider awards if they enter a minimum of six (6) regional rides. All rides started will be counted. Competitive Pleasure horses and riders must enter two (2) rides per season and accumulate a minimum of 20 points to be eligible for yearend placings. Competitive Pleasure horses and riders will be eligible to compete for the High Average Combined Horse/Rider award but must enter a minimum of four (4) rides per season. The top horse in Competitive Pleasure shall be considered as a sweepstakes horse within the class and shall receive 2 additional points as done in the Open and Novice divisions. Novice horses and riders must enter two (2) rides per season and accumulate a minimum of 12 points to be eligible for year-end awards. Horses and riders receive 4 points for ride completion and a sweepstakes horse receives 2 points (18).

Rides are requested to send the results of a ride to national within two weeks after the ride. Region III rider fees should be sent at the same time to the point chairman.

Verification of points and mileage

The point secretary keeps all Region III members' points and mileage each year. You are welcome to verify your points with the chairman by Oct. 15 of the current year, otherwise you must accept the points as calculated by the point secretary. Region III NATRC members who have not renewed their memberships by Mar. 1 of each year will have to pay an additional \$15 secretarial fee if they wish to have either their horse or rider points and mileage recorded. To be eligible for breed awards at each ride, you must send in a copy of your horse's registration papers with the ride entry. This copy will be returned to you the day of the ride.
