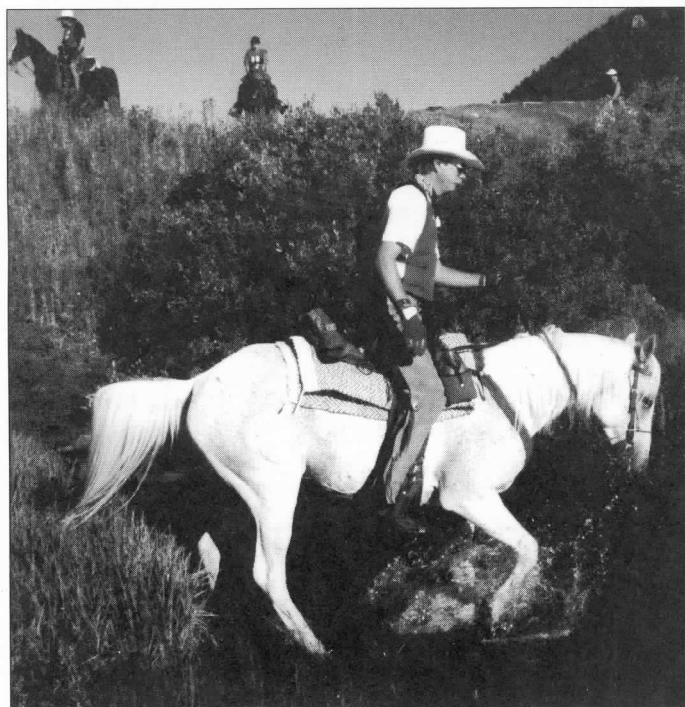

Golden Gate dubbed green gate in '95

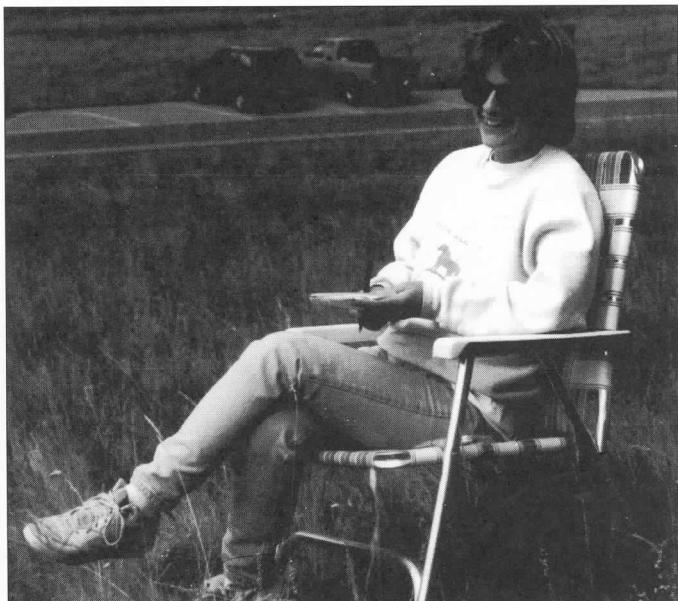
First-time management gives it a cautious try

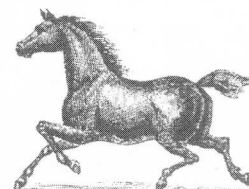

All renewals must be received by that date so the 1996 membership list may be completed. New members of NATRC who wish to become members of Region 3 must pay Region 3 membership fees by the weekend of the last ride of the season to be eligible for regional awards. Applicants for Region 3 must also be national NATRC members. The rules and by-laws of national NATRC will be followed.

East of continental divide, north of I-70. Includes Golden, Ft. Collins, Boulder, Longmont, Loveland, etc.

DISTRICT IV: (Wyoming, Montana and Canada)

DISTRICT V: (Colorado)

San Juan Basin area, west of the continental divide, south of Red Mtn. Pass (New Mexico side). West of the continental divide, north of Hwy. 60. Includes Farmington, Cortez, Mancos, Durango, Pagosa Springs, etc.

DISTRICT VI: (Colorado)

West of the continental divide, north of Red Mtn. Pass (Utah). Includes Grand Junction, Craig, Meeker, Montrose, etc.

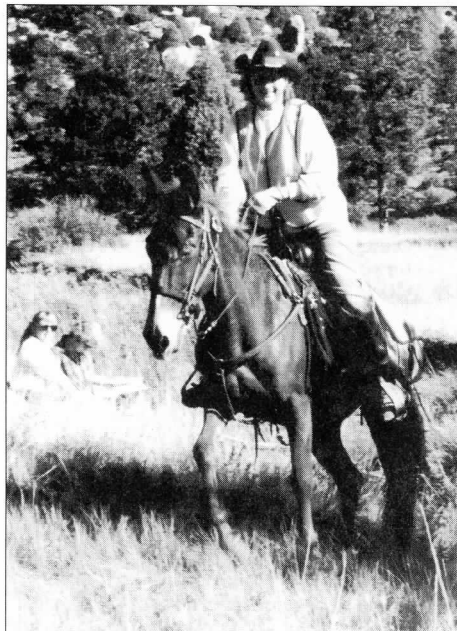
A big thank you

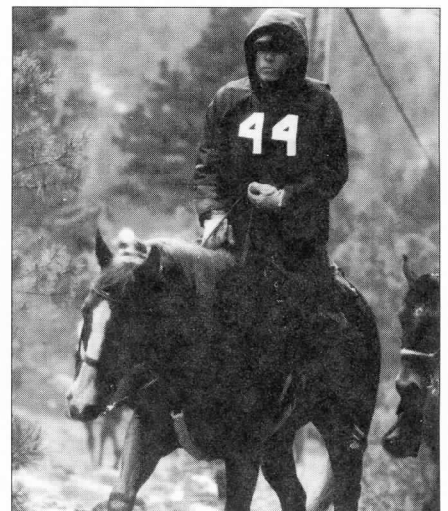
Water the word of the day at Cavalier Ride

The 28th annual NATRC Top of the World competitive trail ride was held in Foxton, Colo., Sept. 2-3, 1995. This year's ride benefitted Region III.

Rider turnout was pretty good, especially considering the VS restrictions in many areas of the southwest, with 41 starting out. In cool mornings and hot afternoons the riders negotiated many trails with excellent footing, competing in a tough ride. Mt. Logan, along with other peaks of the Continental Divide were viewed in the distance.

The many pastures were lush from the plentiful rain this year and provided a nice green backdrop – surprising for the beginning of September.

Dr. Ron Pappan, from Richwood, Mo., was very well-liked, even after his challenging obstacle of asking the open riders hand-gallop over several logs. He and his wife also enjoyed staying and Barb and Tom

Butterfield's ranch house.

The horsemanship judge from Riverton, Wyo., was Patsy Conner. She had plenty to judge from and enjoyed hiking up a rocky trail to observe the riders unseen. Patsy generously donated her time to Region III for this ride.

All of the Region III board members supported the ride with time or donations. Taking some riding time off, Neal McKinstry worked in the position of ride steward.

The P&R teams went in trucks to different check points as well as others that went out on horseback to the more inaccessible spots on the trails. There were many volunteer workers helping – everyone coming out for the benefit of the region.

Along with working as the ride secretary, Lois Arbour headed up the safety riders on her mule Molly. Regrettably, Molly has recently passed away. Our condolences to a hard-working woman.

The delicious dinners were cooked up by Bill and Buddy Smith, assisted by

Bob Santistevan. Bill and Farmington Fire Equipment Co. not only donated all the food, they also donated horsemanship prizes! Bob Santistevan also crafted a beautiful wooden saddle rack for the novice sweepstakes award.

Region 3'ers finish well, work hard at Challenge

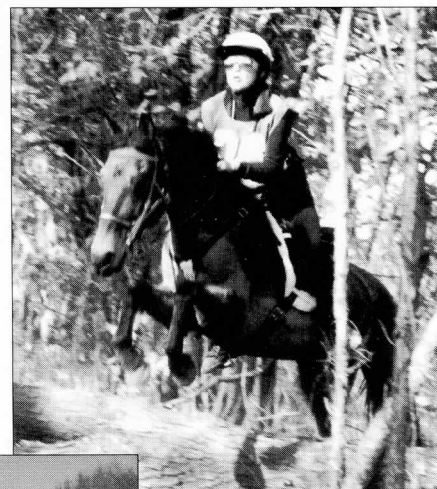

The ride spanned forty miles a day for two days. Judi Tobias pulled her mare Shadow Play at the second P&R on Sunday – when she failed to recover and developed thumps – but both Dean and Judy finished in great

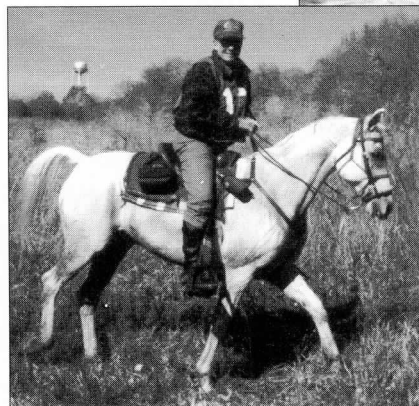

In all, the riders were seen 32 times during the ride. In the end only one-half of a point separated



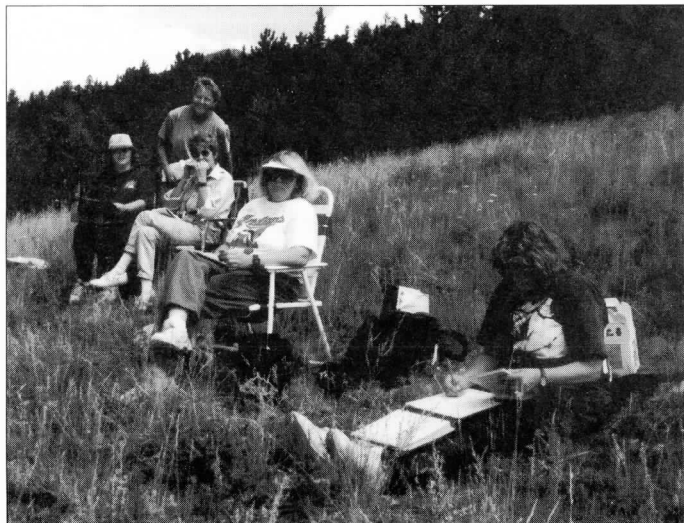

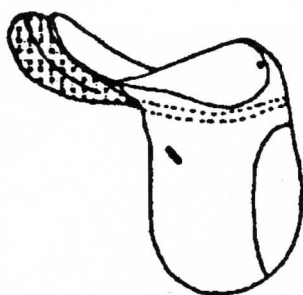

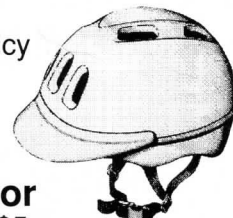
