

Golden Gate dubbed green gate in '95


First-time management gives it a cautious try


A big thank you

The 28th annual NATRC Top of the World competitive trail ride was held in Foxton, Colo., Sept. 2-3, 1995. This year's ride benefitted Region III.

Rider turnout was pretty good, especially considering the VS restrictions in many areas of the southwest, with 41 starting out. In cool mornings and hot afternoons the riders negotiated many trails with excellent footing, competing in a tough ride. Mt. Logan, along with other peaks of the Continental Divide were viewed in the distance.

The many pastures were lush from the plentiful rain this year and provided a nice green backdrop – surprising for the beginning of September.

Dr. Ron Pappan, from Richwood, Mo., was very well-liked, even after his challenging obstacle of asking the open riders hand-gallop over several logs. He and his wife also enjoyed staying and Barb and Tom Butterfield's ranch house.

The horsemanship judge from Riverton, Wyo., was Patsy Conner. She had plenty to judge from and enjoyed hiking up a rocky trail to observe the riders unseen. Patsy generously donated her time to Region III for this ride.

Along with working as the ride secretary, Lois Arbour headed up the safety riders on her mule Molly. Regrettably, Molly has recently passed away. Our condolences to a hard-working woman.

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
