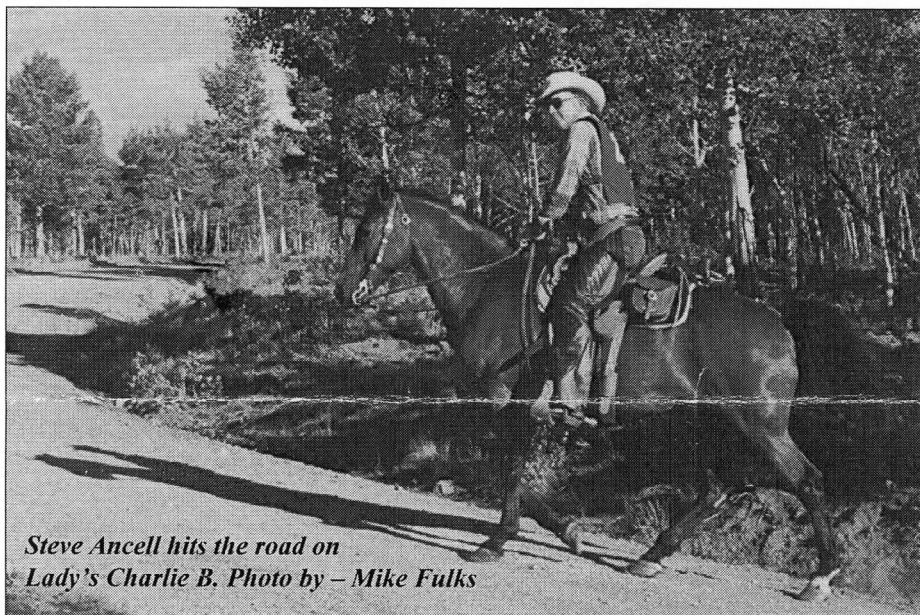
Willow Springs has a Dual Personality

The “new” Willow Springs ride had a dual personality in the form of both an A ride and a B ride.

This ambitious format was taken on by Co-chairs Dee Overholt and Sue McKelvy. They had lots of help from the likes of Tracy Scarlett (Awards), Kris Cummings (Ride Secretary), and Cathy Moore (Trailmaster). The new location, while lacking the antique charm of the brimming wooden stock tank, had plenty of firm ground for campers and trailers to park levelly. Bob Cummings as “Waterman” kept the various poly and metal tanks full for horses to drink.

The weekend saw the return of afternoon summer thunderstorms that did a nice job of cooling things down while, for the most part, holding off until the riders were back in camp. Scenic views were so spectacular that riders did not mind the challenge of “broken arm” mounts and other requests for performance the from the four judges, Linda MacKinnon and Kim McKenzie (Vet Judges), Janine Ancell and Frank Keeran (Horsemanship judges). The extra set of judges was because of the A and B ride format. Ride Management appreciated the judges' cooperative spirits in dividing up judging assignments, which made it possible for the judges to see the riders a lot more often than normal.

This event would have “crashed” had it not been for our volunteer workers who sweated in the sun waiting for riders for P&Rs, the safety riders who followed the

competitors, the pre-riders who tied ribbons (beating out groups of hungry cattle who had quite a taste for soy-based surveyors tape), the timer who worked despite a distinct allergy to horses and hay, the judge's secretaries who bounced in cars to judging sites scribbling scores and comments in the books so that placings and awards were correctly made and riders had information to know what to work on before the next ride. We especially thank Brian Sevits, Peyton, CO who rode safety two days and filled in as horseshoer for several competitors. The efforts by all these dedicated workers were gratefully appreciated by all!

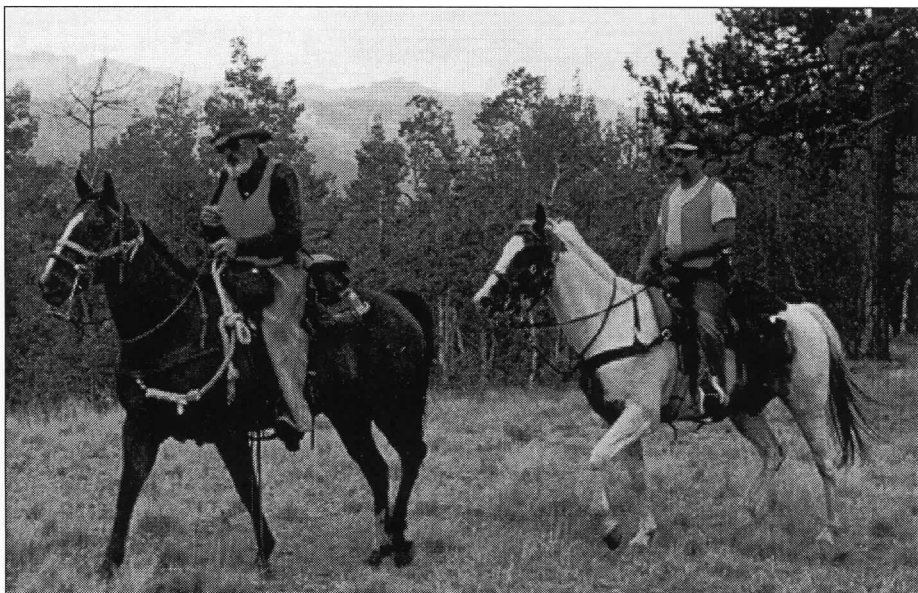
1999 Seminar

Here are some items from the National Board meeting in Kansas City in July. In your latest edition Hoof Print, you will find a survey (it's the blue form in the center). Please fill it out and send it to Stephanie Ostrowski as soon as possible. If you think we are being nosy, we aren't. We are trying to get sponsors for things like the Championship Challenge ride and to help with national awards and we need to show possible sponsors that we have members who spend money on products like theirs. If you feel uncomfortable answering any of the questions, just leave that square blank. But, we need the input from our members to go to folks like Ford or MacDonald's and say, "We have members who use your product; now, can you please support our sport?"

In that same line, NATRC signed an agreement with Sundowner Trailers, so Sundowner is now the official sponsor of our organization. For the next two years, they will underwrite the cost of our national year end awards! These enthusiastic folks have some other plans to help

Finally, Judi Tobias is chairing a

committee to investigate whether to give national year end awards to C/P and Novice. She is to go to the Board meeting in November with recommendations.

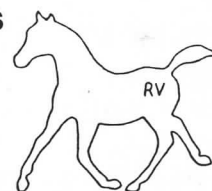

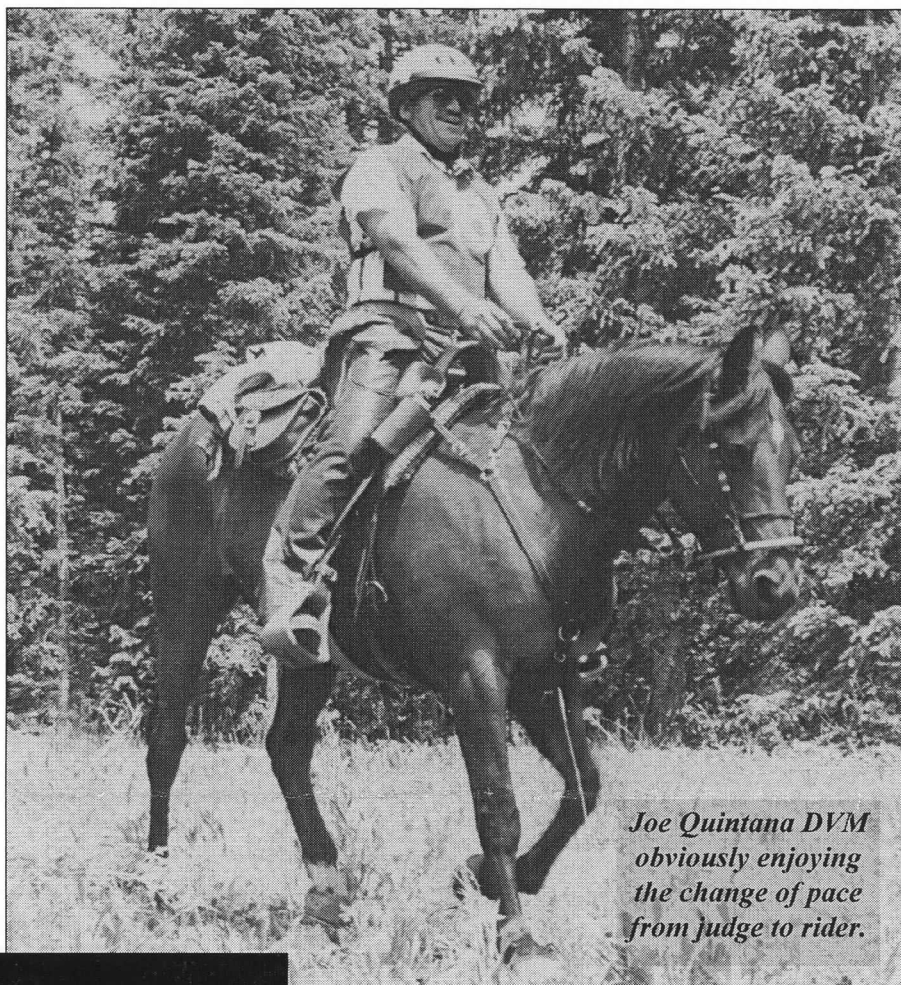
El Jinete, Spectacular as Always

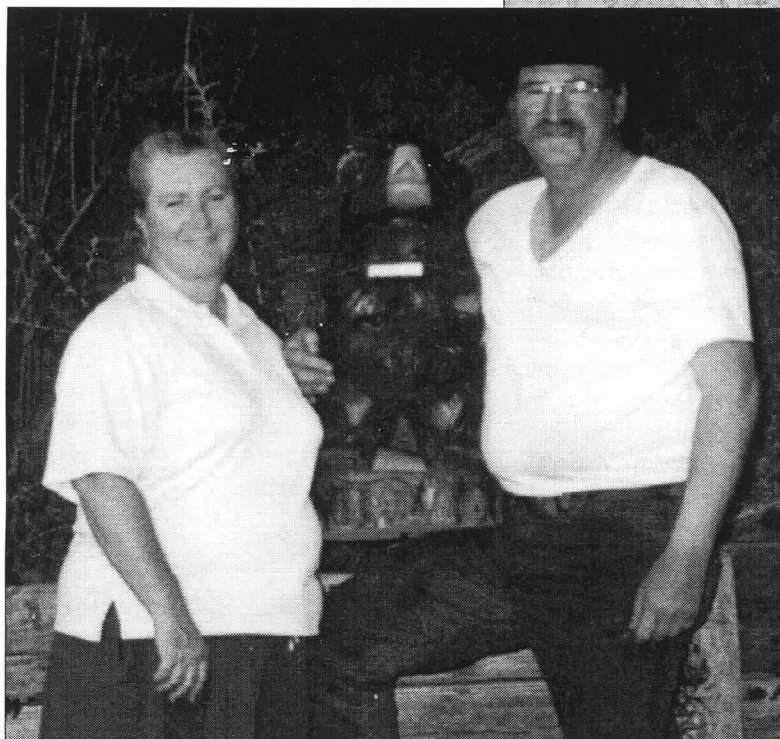

WHY DID THE JUDGE HAVE US DO...???

I frequently get asked why a judge asks for a particular obstacle. mostly by novice riders but sometimes even by more experienced riders. For example, why should our horse be asked to back up a hill or around a tree when he is supposed to be a going-down-the-trail-horse?

Those of us that have a tendency to ride pretty rough country become aware that the more directions of control you have the more likely you are to come back happy. I have personally ridden my poor horse into terrible predicaments of wire and downed trees and trails to nowhere, bogs and rocks. What a pleasure it is to have the horse do what you ask calmly and without question.

Quite honestly, much of what we ask is not natural. The first time you ask your horse to back up a hill, they can't do it. But what happens if you've ridden down a steep, narrow trail and get blocked. The other day we were looking for a trail and had to cross a hundred yards of downed timber to get to it. Going around was not an option. Since we have spent a lot of time practicing stepping calmly over logs it was a piece of cake.

I kind of thought maybe a series of articles talking about the various judged observations you might be asked to perform would be helpful. Therefore, with the power of my office I threw this idea out at the board meeting and it was enthusiastically received with lots of volunteers to write the articles.

We will try to cover various types of a similar obstacle you might be asked for, why the obstacle has value for a trail horse, what the judge is probably looking for and how to work with your horse before you get to the ride to be ready to confidentially perform the skill.

This is a team sport so we will also discuss horsemanship techniques. For example, the horsemanship judge may ask you to ride into and out of a gully. If your horse has been trained to go slowly through the bottom you will

have a little more time to transition elegantly from downhill posture to uphill.

The series will begin with the next newsletter. We hope to have articles on:

- The presentation (check-in/out)
- Trailer Tying and safety
- Backing
- Ponying and logs
- The Transition
- The uphill
- The mount
- Turn on the hindquarters
- and more.

If you have a particular skill you need some help with or if you have a pet obstacle and would like to write an article let Excellent-Editor Dan know. This should be fun and hope you find some pearls of wisdom in these articles.
