PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hope you all had a wonderful Holiday season and your New Year is filled with Heath and Happy trails.

I've enjoyed being the President of Region 3 this year. Even though my life was too busy for me to spend all the time I should, we have such a wonderful group of board members and chairmen that the work pretty much got done without me. I would like to thank everyone for all their efforts. The board has come up with some innovative ideas and interesting programs to try to grow our wonderful sport. My greatest fear is that if we don't grow, we will perish.

We have an exciting season before us with several brand new rides and the Colorado Trail Ride rising from ashes. We are planning a membership drive: if you sell 2 memberships you will get a free membership. There will also be a District Challenge Competition for new members. The district with the largest percentage of new members wins possession of a beautiful traveling trophy (donated by Bill and Jenny Smith). Surely our District 3 will win, we might as well get the trophy engraved now. It would be nice to have a little competition though.

Let's talk rider pacing. My personal preference is to ride at the back of the pack. I do not like riding with the crush of folks at the front. I feel like I can find a space without a lot of horses to distract mine easier near the rear, there are lots of footprints to help me between ribbons, it's peaceful, I get to enjoy the scenery. What amazes me however is that although I usually ride right on my median time, ride management tends to panic because everyone else is so far ahead. . It occurs to me that if I have an allotment of time to do a trail, it is to my horse's benefit if I use as much of the time as I can (without having a nervous breakdown). I take it a little slower and walk the rough stuff.

This subject comes to mind because there are some complaints about how rocky some of the trails at Golden Gate are becoming. I agree, they are, but if the rough spots are timed at a walk we can normally get safely through them. I believe this is part of the "Good Horsemanship" and careful horse we are supposed to be encouraging. You may say it is not good horsemanship to ride on rocks, I say balderdash! Frequently when we are out on trails in the mountains they are rock and it is good to have a horse accustomed to going slowly and carefully. I have even been known to ride horses barefooted in rocks to teach them this caution.

The new NATRC rule on shoeing is "there are no rules". This is great for horses that have a problem and need corrective shoeing, or for endurance riders that don't want to re-shoe a padded horse to do a NATRC ride. However, the original NATRC purpose was to encourage the breeding, selection and training of good trail horses AND encourage riding to help our horses over the trail in a safe and careful manner. It is not apparent to me how rushing padded horses over bad footing fosters any of the principals NATRC is about. Hopefully, the convenience of "same" shoeing will outweigh the negative aspects.

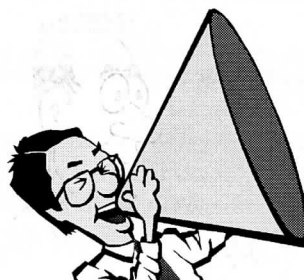
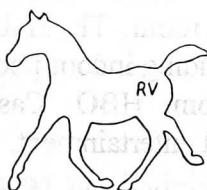

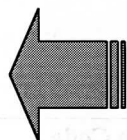

A Letter from Susan McKelvy

I held off writing to permit time's passage for some perspective. My concern is the trails we ask our horses to travel in our sport. In the past two years I've been on two competitive rides in which I adjudged the trails at the time of the ride and in retrospect to be dangerous to my horse and to me. The first was the infamous Brown's Park ride "Outlaw Trail" and the second is the most recently completed Golden Gate Canyon this past September.

Any ride in which 90% or more of the competing horses check out with varying degrees of lameness has a fundamental problem. I believe that problem is squarely the responsibility of the ride management particularly the ride's Trailmaster. The trailmaster's job is a big one. I know, for I've done it several times. The Trailmaster has to sleuth out, time and assess the trails for judging points, P & R team accessibility and safety. The last item seems to be taking a back burner to other considerations. We cannot expect people in this sport to come to more than one ride if their experience on that ride was unsatisfactory. My experience and those of others with whom I've discussed the problem on the Golden Gate Ride this year was highly stressful due to the extreme rockiness. No matter how attractive the location, the Trailmaster has a responsibility to call off a ride if he or she judges the trails to be hazardous to competitors and their horses. The Golden Gate ride should have been cancelled after the Trailmaster rode the

trails. Too many horses were injured as the record of lameness attests in the execution of the ride.

Golden Gate Canyon State Park has spent substantial funds improving the campsites and adding campground amenities but nothing has been done in trail maintenance. Erosion and traffic has taken quite a toll. It is my belief that the Park really wants to discourage horseback riders and encourage only foot traffic. They have not come right out and stated it but their current program seems to indicate that is their plan.

Every year we acquire one or two new rides which is good. I usually hate to see rides cease such as the Top of the World but in this case, for me, the Golden Gate Canyon Ride has ceased. I will not ask my horse to traverse the rocks there again. Region III needs to ask themselves, are there rides that should not be sanctioned because of the unsuitability of the trail and they need to recommend against sanctioning such rides in the future. We all know how much we've got invested economically and in conditioning time in pursuit of our goals in Competitive Trail Riding and we need to be certain our sanctioned rides have trails which are safe in footing for the horses and riders. This should not be done after a Ride has occurred but should be done before it is sanctioned or maybe even proposed for sanction.
