Now that ride season has begun, I think it would be nice if all of us could take some time to examine how we appear to our new members and competitors.

I remember that my first year of competition Check-ins petrified me; was a pretty scary one. briefings filled me with confusion and often with dread of what the next day's ride would bring. I approached every obstacle with anxiety. Everyone else seemed to be having so much fun; why was I so miserable? I felt so alone.

Then, after a few rides, I got up the nerve to introduce myself to some people who looked as if they wouldn't mind being bothered. (Now, those of you who know me may think that I'm making this up, but I'm not --- I really WAS shy and withdrawn in the beginning.) Some of the people I approached, riders, management, judges, etc., were very helpful, and some were obviously put off by my questions. To those helpful ones I owe the passion I have for NATRC today.

Our region has really started to grow in the last couple of years. But its success will not be measured by how many new members we sign up each year. If new members are not made to feel welcome, they will not come back. And they will miss the best of what we have to offer, beautiful trails, lifelong friendships, and a priceless education for horse owners.

Every season I realize how much more there is to learn, but I have also come to realize how important it is to share our love for the sport with others. This doesn't mean giving unwanted advice. It just means finding ways to lend a helping hand. Introduce yourself to anyone you don't know. Find out where a new rider is camped and stroll over for a chat. # PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

There seems to be lots of interest in competitive trail riding this year. We've had seven clinics in the region, all full, the rides are filling fast with first-time many competitors, and the region's membership is up. Things are looking good, but we must be sure that the first-time competitors have a great time and want to come back for more. It's up to all of us to welcome these folks.

The board has come up with some ideas that I think are quite good. Thanks to the wonderful convention that Bill and Jenny Smith put on, we made extra money that we wanted to do something meaningful with. We felt that one of the most serious problems that NATRC is having is not enough vet judges. It is very difficult to get one when you put on a ride, and the few we do have are seriously overworked, get burned out, quit judging. absolutely could not have our rides without these judges. The board felt that what is needed is for us all to get involved with a program that would recruit new judges and make it more pleasant for the wonderful judges we have.

First, we are going to put together a video that will combine the "Come Ride With Us" video and the excellent "Vet Judging" video made several years ago. We are also trying to get a little video made on how to become a judge to add to the other two. We will get copies of them made, and, when you have softened your vet enough to watch the video, let us know and we will send

you a copy to give to him or her.

Next, each vet judge that judges in our region this year will get a certificate for a free ride of their choice in Region 3, good for three years, plus whatever meals are available for the riders. The rides will be reimbursed for the entry and fees and meals. Perhaps this will make the judges feel more appreciated.

We also gave \$1,000 to National to use toward a vet judge recruitment program. For example, it could be used to help defray some of the expenses of apprentice judges. We also challenged the other regions to match our donation and come up with even better programs. If each region could recruit several new judges each year, we would go a long way toward solving the problem. So start working on your vet!

We are also trying to implement a mentor program. Of course, each of us is expected to help make the new riders feel welcome and help them in any way we can. But we will have volunteer "Mentors" with a sign in their windshields that says, "Ask Me. I'm A Mentor." Maybe new competitors will feel more comfortable asking a We have to do mentor. whatever we can to make the new riders want to come back. New blood is what will support our sport in the future. # Is It A Basketball Player, A Jogger, A "CAT BURGLAR"??? NO, IT'S WOODY!!!

Some of you may have noticed that my horse was wearing funny rubber boots ("Horsesneakers") at the Rabbit Valley Ride. I am trying to leave my horse barefoot this year to see if barefoot is really best. (Perhaps you visited with the Hoof Care Specialist, Martha Olivo, at the National Convention.) The theory is that a properly trimmed bare hoof is much healthier and transmits much less shock than a hoof constricted by a shoe.

If our horses lived and traveled a lot in the area you are going to ride them in, their hooves would actually get tough enough after about a year to support barefoot comfortably. Their hooves actually grow stronger with more challenge. Well, in practice, this theory breaks down a little when I take them out of my lush, soft pasture where they hardly have to move to find food and haul them to some rocky, hard area and expect to ride sixty miles. So, the rubber boots get us through the year of toughening and the rougher terrain.

We did have a very successful first ride and had no trouble or chafing or tendon soreness. I will say that Woody has been barefoot for six months now and his feet have never looked better. His normally underrun heel is actually moving back under his leg and the hooves are getting very tight-looking. It is a long season, and I will keep you posted.

#### THE SEVEN BASICS

Cheri Jeffcoat, NATRC National Board member and a Region 6 member, sponsored a recent clinic with the Nebraska Endurance & Competitive Trail Ride Association, and summarized seven important basics that we should train our horses to do. These were printed in the NECTRA newsletter and are so excellent that I felt they should be shared with our members.

1. STAND! Whether it is standing for the mount, standing to settle before backing, or standing to wait to receive a cue, it is the most important basic training you can give your horse.

- 2. FULL STOP/HALT. Whether it is at the walk, trot, or canter, it is a demonstration of the use of seat, legs, and hands to control the horse. It is very important that you be able to stop your horse without heavy hands with the horse throwing its head up and you yanking the horse's mouth wide open.
- 3. HALF-HALT. The half-halt provides you with the means to slow a horse down, the way to give and take on the reins to maintain control and pace on a downhill and is invaluable in many different ways. It accustoms the horse to listening to you.
- 4. BACKING WITHOUT RESISTANCE. Often the horse may toss its head or resist in some other fashion. The suggestion is to teach your horse to back with set, leg, and hand cues. It is also the same give and take on the reins that is used in the half-halt. If you are trying to back with only hand/reins and heavy pressure, that causes the horse to open its mouth (probably in pain), then you need to reassess how you are cueing your horse. In breaking down what you do, the first cue is the shift in weight as you turn to look back and then turn to face forward. The second cue is the shift of weight back on your seat, a light give and take of the rein, and a cue with your feet/legs. Think about breaking down HOW you are asking your horse to back.
- 5. TURNS ON THE FOREHAND AND REAR. What does this do for you? First, it means your horse is giving to your leg. Secondly, it allows you to position your horse more precisely. You may be positioning the rear end to back between the hitching posts or into a deadened with trees. You may be positioning the front for opening a gate. Or trying to sidepass an L-shaped pattern and you need to position the front or rear to make the turn of the L.
- 6. STAY IN GAIT. How many of you trot along and allow your horse to break into a canter...and you did not cue your horse to do so? How about cueing your horse to take one step at a time? Or, just trotting along and the horse falls into the walk without being cued to do so. Something to think about.
- 7. SIDEPASS. The final basic is essentially a giving to leg pressure. Whether you are sidepassing to open a gate, sidepassing to tie a ribbon to mark trail, it is an example of the use of leg and seat.

# FROM A JUNIOR'S POINT OF VIEW....

I have been a junior rider in NATRC and Region 3 for three years. I have found that NATRC is a fun place to get together and visit with friends adn make new friends. It allows me to do what I like most....riding. In NATRC I have learned a lot about horses, their conditioning, and how to have fun riding. I have also found that getting together with other NATRC members and talking with them, or listening to a friend play a guitar and sing is fun too.

NATRC is a fun place for a family vacation. You get to see lots of different trails and you get to meet lots of different people.

NATRC has helped me and other people become better riders. You are judged on how you ride and take care of your horse. Your horse is judged on condition, soundness, and trail manners. You can learn a lot just by competing against yourself.

I don't just ride NATRC for fun and to become a better rider. I ride NATRC to see new places and make friends.

# SUMMARY OF REGION 3 BOARD MEETING - APRIL 16, 2000

Members present: Judy Mason, Dianna Thearin, Donna Schriefer, Judd Adams, Dee Overholt, Judy Benham, Betty Wolgram.

National Board Members present: Bill Smith and Kathy Shanor.

Board Members Absent: Dan Fredal and Marc Shanor.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved with no corrections.

Summary of Treasurer's Report presented by Kathy Shanor for Marc Shanor, was approved. Marc requested and the Board approved moving the Bretag, Burkdoll, and Tyree funds to Western Federal Credit Union, which will allow electronic fund transfers.

Membership Report: Kathy Shanor for Marc Shanor. 157 members, 25 new members, 37 juniors, of which two are non-family members.

Membership Directory. The directory will be printed after Rabbit Valley Ride in order to include recent memberships.

Newsletter and Ridebook: Betty Wolgram reported that ridebook is being distributed. Betty requested articles explaining why judges ask riders to do different types of obstacles. Donna Schriefer will write an article on backing due July 1. Judy Mason will ask Kathy Budd to do an article on the canter stop.

Clinic Reports: Craig: February 28, classroom day, and March 25, horse and rider, conducted by Betty Wolgram. Denver, March 11, classroom and demonstration at Linda Fisher clinic, Judd Adams. Grand Junction: March 12, classroom and riding, Sue Benjamin. Cedaredge, April 8, Judy Mason. April 8, Ogden, Utah, Bruce Heckelman. Colorado Springs, April 22, Erv Perelstein. Boulder, June 2-3, classroom and riding, Jill Hicks, Bobbi Chenoweth, and Judd Adams.

Attendance at most of these clinics has been around 25 horses/riders, and they have been very well-received.

Publicity: Judy Mason will contact Roxann Lane to see if she will do this job.

Historian: Kathe Hayes has volunteered if Larry Keckler will transfer the materials.

Junior Rider Program: Kathy Shanor. The Board discussed factors influencing junior participation in the Region. Kathy will write to juniors to learn what help they need and also write an article for the newsletter soliciting adult riders who would be willing to be mentors to juniors.

National Board Report Highlights. Region 3 and National each received \$2,000 from the National

Convention. Bill and Jenny received many thanks and congratulations on the Convention.

Bill reported on an "unsportsmanship" case in another region. National, after consulting with its attorney, will be issuing guidance to the regions. Meanwhile, there are some lessons to be learned. As riders, and especially as Board members, we should intervene if we observe inappropriate behavior at a ride. If the rider's behavior does not change, we should notify Ride Management, who should instruct the rider to "cease and desist" or they will be suspended from competition. If the behavior persists at additional rides, the Board should suspend the rider from further competition within the Region. If the behavior occurs at rides in other regions, these Boards will be responsible for taking appropriate action.

National, after a review of its finances, has reinstated providing awards for regional placings and National Championships back to the status of 1998. The President's Cup has also been reinstated, but it is now based on points accumulated during 16 rides as opposed to an unlimited number of rides previously. Mentor Program: Betty Wolgram is making twenty laminated windshield plaques saying "I Am A Mentor - Ask Me" for use at the rides.

CP Regional Awards. Judy Benham will send a copy of the computer program that computes high average award via email to Dee and Judd for them to analyze how the award is computed.

Vest Money (Reserve Fund): Board approved the expenditure of some of the reserve fund to help recruit more vet judges. Region 3 will give \$1,000 and challenge other regions to do the same to create a fund to compensate apprentice judges, to be administered by Dr. Jerry Weil. The Board will put together a video tape package for region members to share with prospective vet judges. The Board adopted a policy of "judge a ride, get a free ride," to apply to vet judging in Region 3.

By-Laws Changes: The Board adopted recommended changes from Sue Benjamin dealing with the nominating committee and Sue Bretag Service and Region 3 Appreciation Awards.

Worker Points: Judd Adams submitted a report suggesting that the Board review the list of jobs that receive worker points and consider additions and deletions to that list. Board members will study the suggested changes and discuss at the next Board meeting at Willow Springs Ride on June 9, 11:00 a.m.

# ATTENTION RIDE MANAGERS AND TRAILMASTERS!!!

Please make the effort to time your ride completely, i.e. both days, and to have pre-riders. We want the many new competitors who are trying CTR this year to have a really positive experience. It will definitely not be a positive experience if they get lost or have to trot all day when they are told that the novice pace is mostly at a walk and that the trails are well-marked. I know most of you have been putting on the rides for many years and have frequently used many of the same trails in previous years. I know there is a great temptation to use previous years' timing for different sections and add them together. The NATRC requirement for "ride timing" the trail will help you find and prevent errors and save a lot of rider frustration and anxiety. It works best if someone unfamiliar with the trail can time it as that will check the marking also. OPEN AND CP RIDERS, IF YOU LIVE NEAR A RIDE, please volunteer to help with this critical part of the ride preparation!

Please note that the rule book criteria for Novice and CP is 30-40 miles at 3.5 to 5 MPH and for Open is 50-60 miles at 4-6 MPH DEPENDING on terrain, weather, and footing. (It is better, particularly for Novice, to err on the slower side.)


