Judy Mason is trying to get permission to allow more riders in this year and possibly get another set of judges, but send in your entry early to be assured a spot. And all the other area volunteers make this one of the best organized and well-run rides in the region.

REGION 3 BOARD ACTION AND INFORMATION

By e-mail and at Board meeting held at the Louie Pavetti Ride held at Rabbit Valley, Colorado, on April 20, 2001, the following board actions were taken:

- 1) Treasurer Marc Shanor presented financial information. Expenses have outpaced revenues year-to-date but that is to be expected as revenues from rides have just started coming in. The Board discussed dues and the impact of the new dues structure and concluded that it has negatively impacted income this year and will probably have a similar impact next year, but thereafter should no longer have an impact.
- 2) Kathy Shanor presented a report on the most recent National Board Meeting held in February. She shared insights on the poor attendance at the National Convention in California, including the apparent high cost with little detail on what the cost covered, the fact that the entire payment had to be made up front, the inability to use a credit card to pay, and its being scheduled at a time of the year when money is often short (right after Christmas). Kathy will share these insights with her peers on the National Board. This year nationally sponsored regional awards were based on the combination of horse and rider points in all divisions and weights (formerly only the horse points counted). While this change was documented in Board meeting notes, it still took a number of people by surprise. Kathy was asked to continue to advocate our request to publish policy/rule changes at least two times before a rule is put into effect. The next National Board meeting is scheduled for the Denver Tech Center Sheraton on July 13-15. Members should contact Bill Smith and/or Kathy Shanor if they have any concerns they want addressed.
- 3) It was decided to have new vests made to be ready for the 2002 season for C/P Division.
- 4) Decision was made to fund a request from Janine Ancell for \$161 for the Historian Report.
- 5) Decision was made to again donate \$100 to the Morris Foundation.
- 6) Kathy Shanor informed the Board that she had sent the \$500 authorized by the Board by email for signage of Indian Creek Trail near Sedalia with the hopes that a ride will be held there in the near future.
- 7) Board decision to provide clinic coupons for

attendees to use at the first ride they attend. The region will reimburse the ride for the \$10 coupons they get from the clinic riders.

8) The Region has acquired computer software to track mileage and other statistics.

9) Board was informed that the Sagebrush & Cedar Benefit Ride currently has 75 riders so they may try to get two more sets of judges. Lee Hoth made a request to keep some of the money made at this year's ride back as seed money for the next ride. Lee was advised to find out how much money they thought they would need. Board would consider depending on how much profit the ride generates. Topic of funding for new region rides arose. Board approved providing seed money to new rides IF the rides follow certain guidelines. Marc Shanor and Doreen Portner will create some guidelines and report back to the Board.

10) Linell Miller reported that although the NATRC booth at the Horse Expo did not see the traffic she would have liked to see due to bad location, it is still worth doing. One idea to secure a better position next year was to investigate teaming up with a breed (since breed associations always have the center aisle locations).

11) By earlier e-mail decision, the Board approved the use of weight cards in our region and to honor other regions' weight cards. Riders will be weighed with all their tack at the first ride they attend and will be given a card attesting that weight. For the rest of the ride season, riders will present their weight cards to the Weighmaster. The Weighmaster can reweigh a rider at any time. Note** A new NATRC rule passed for the 2001 ride season gives a penalty for failure to maintain weight during a ride: "Rider weight classification must be maintained throughout the ride. Failure to maintain weight classification will result in completion points only for both horse and rider."

12) Board decided to move the Regional Convention for 2001 ride season to the first weekend in March, 2002. Benefits include potentially better weather, farther away from busy holidays, the ability to distribute ride books at the Convention, and the opportunity to make a big deal of National Awards.

13) Board voted to waive the "five firsts and you're out" rule for Novices this year. Novices may continue to compete and accumulate year-end points even if they achieve five first places in either horse or horsemanship.

The next Board meeting will be held at the Island in the Sky ride.

When and how did your interest in horses begin? How long have you been riding?

When I was four or five years old, I visited my grandfather in Idaho and rode his work horses. I immediately loved the smell of horses. I rode livery horses when I was growing up in Denver and that taught me to ride almost anything. I did develop the bad habit of being heavy-handed but Lee helped me with that after we were married. I owned my first horse when I was in the seventh grade, a quarterhorse named Starfire.

What kind(s) of horse(s) do you have, name(s) and age(s)? We have two grade quarterhorses, Fancy, 18, and Blackberry, 5; a registered breeding stock paint, Cinco, 8; two half-Arabs, Honey, 11, and Will, 5; and a Tennessee Walker cross, Hillbilly, 7.

How long have you been a member of NATRC and Region 3, how did you first hear about NATRC, and in what capacity have you been involved as a member? I have been a member since 1995. Years ago, when Neal McKinstry lived in Craig, I remember he talked a lot about NATRC, but I didn't think much about it. I was raising my kids and they were all involved in rodeo and gymkhana. Then, in 1995, Betty Wolgram and I attended a clinic that Neal helped put on in Whitewater out of Grand Junction. We were almost instantly hooked. I have been a ride secretary for three rides, the Outlaw Trail Ride held at Brown's Park, and twice for the Sagebrush & Cedar Ride in Maybell, Colorado. My husband Lee is also the safety chairman for the region and is Trailmaster for the Maybell rides. We both marked and timed trail for these rides, too.

What do you like most about NATRC? Region 3? What would you change if you could? I love riding all the beautiful trails and most

of the members are very friendly. I wish we could get more vet judges in Region 3. Sometimes I wish NATRC would alter the vet judge standards and allow any qualified equine vets to judge. Vet judges are getting ridiculously hard to find for our rides.

What are your goals for you and your horse this season? That my horse stays sound and that I stay safe and have fun.

If you could change one thing about yourself and your horse, what would it be? I would make my horse shorter! Sometimes I would like to be a little more competitive than I am.

What else would you like to share? Region 3 has a good thing going and we need to keep it that way!

MEET YOUR FELLOW NATRC MEMBERS

When and how did your interest in horses begin? How long have you been riding?

I've always had an interest in horses, but I did not own one until the summer of 1998. I bought a 3-year-old, unbroke colt and my education about horses started. I was told the best way to break my young horse was "wet saddle blankets." So I rode this young horse every other day that first summer. I learned how not to fall off, and he learned that everything was not going to hurt him.

What kind(s) of horse(s) do you have, name(s) and age(s)? Porter is unregistered. He is 1/2 Arab/1/2 Saddlebred. I bought the horse on kind of a distressed sale. As such, no papers were included. He was foaled in 1995. Leos Red Fox is a registered APHA Sorrel Tobiano. He was foaled in 1997. My daughter Jasmine will be riding him in CTR this summer. Trixie is a 11-year-old Shetland pony cross that I bought for my younger daughter for Christmas. Since I have become so involved with the horses, I wanted to get my younger daughters started.

How long have you been a member of NATRC and Region 3, how did you first hear about NATRC, and in what capacity have you been involved as a member? I joined NATRC in February, 2000. As I started breaking Porter, I was told that he had a natural ability towards endurance. So I started looking at endurance-type events. In searching on the Internet, I came across competitive trail riding and decided that was more my speed than endurance. I rode in four sanctioned rides last year and one unsanctioned ride.

What do you like most about NATRC? Region 3? What would you change if you could? I like rubbing shoulders with other horse people and learning from them. I want to see more rides closer to home. Hence, I need to help develop more support for the sport in my home state. Not everybody can afford to pull a horse trailer for ten hours to attend a weekend event. I'd also like to see a few "B" rides here locally for those people who don't want to ride on Sunday.

What are your goals for you and your horse this season? For myself, have fun! For

my horse, learn to stand while I mount!

If you could change one thing about yourself and your horse, what would it be?

I have not spent the time to really train my horse (not that I know how). Nor am I willing to spend money to send him off to a professional trainer. I would like to have a more responsive horse and know how to cue him. We are both still learning.

What else would you like to share? I joined NATRC and have attended rides to learn more about my horse and how to ride. It has given me the opportunity to ride trails that I would never have ridden on my own. I have met some wonderful people who have been very willing to share their knowledge and help me. I am trying to give back to the sport by sponsoring the Strawberry CTR this July, and I suspect that I will continue to be involved in hosting it or other rides for the next few years. I look forward to seeing everybody at the rides.

**REGION 3 MENTOR PROGRAM EXPANDS
FOR 2001 RIDE SEASON**

Region 3's mentor program is designed to assist new and/or inexperienced competitors to our sport and to help them with questions they may have about the rules, check-in and check-out procedures, timing, and other techniques of competitive trail riding. Knowledge of what happens at a ride allows a more enjoyable time for all. Having a mentor can lessen anxiety and increase confidence in both self and horse and foster more enjoyment of the sport.

This year we are trying to give special encouragement to those who want to help and to those who need help. Mentors may be riders in any division. They should be prepared to deal with all aspects of a competitive trail ride, from stabling to check-in and check-out, ride briefing, map reading, questions about rules, and, of course, cooking and camping tips and introducing newcomers around.

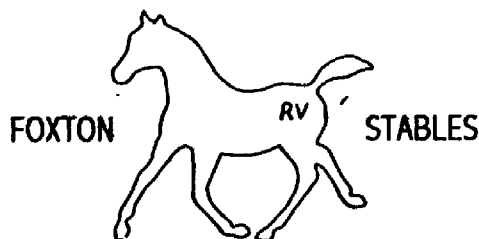
Both "mentors" and "mentees" can sign up for each ride in the blank provided on the ride entry form. Ride management will pair them unless they indicate a preference. I would like to ask that the ride secretaries put some kind of note in the mentors' and mentees' packets so they will know who their partners are. It would also be nice for management to introduce the partners at the ride briefings.

Mentor assistance between rides may also be available if riders contact me. This can give riders a chance to practice skills without the stress of a ride and get to know a rider in their area.

I would also like for ride secretaries to send me a list of all participants and their addresses after your ride is over. I would like to plan a follow-up evaluation of their experiences to examine the results of the program this year. Riders and ride management can contact me at P.O. Also, if you stop at a stream to sponge your horse, be sure to move away from any area where other horses may drink.

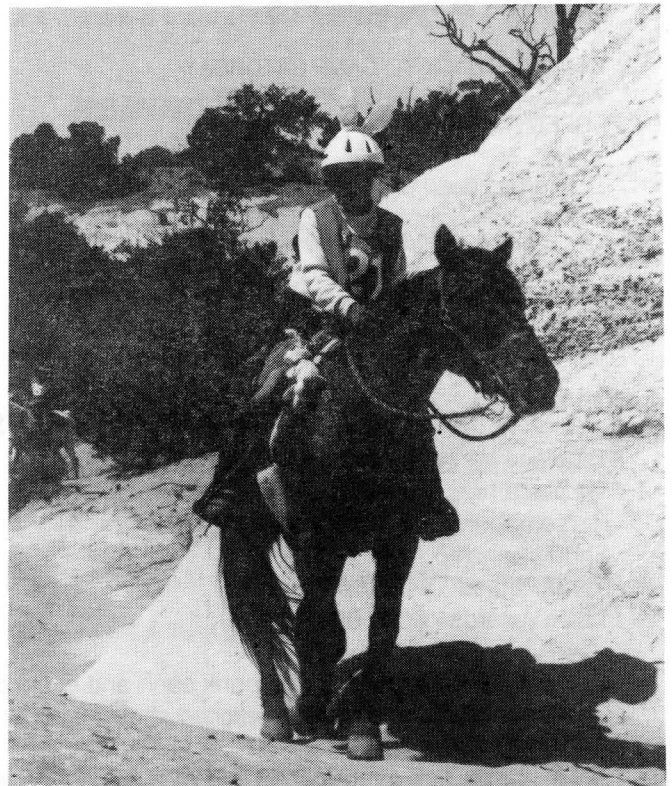

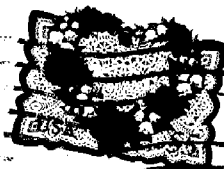
