From the Editor's Desk:

This year's regional convention, held in Denver at the Embassy Suites on Saturday, January 18, was a time to learn. a time to plan ahead, and a time to celebrate.

Following the Region 3 Board of Directors meeting held from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. (see summary of Board meeting inside), three excellent speakers shared their expertise: Fort Dodge representative Michael Dietzenbach gave a much appreciated update on West Nile Virus; Dr. Dwight Bennett of CSU spoke on coat color genetics, and Dr. Doug Hill, Golden Animal Hospital, supplied a very beneficial and informative handout with his presentation on equine teeth and dentistry.

After lunch, our own Region 3 members Mike Mason and Jeff Brown presented an excellent GPS seminar. Thank you so much for sharing your knowledge and experience.

The annual general membership meeting followed at 4:00 p.m. District 1 won the membership trophy for the highest percentage of new members for 2002. Following the membership meeting was a ride management meeting held to share ideas to improve the season's rides.

The day drew quickly to a close and it was soon time for the Awards Banquet. As I heard all the names called for worker awards, I felt so proud that we have, in our region, so many people who are willing to volunteer their time to help put on rides and perform so many other services for the region. And remember, these points are incremental, which means that there are many who volunteered in some way this past year who did not reach or were between one of the recognition "marks." We STILL appreciate all of you! Neither the region nor the rides could function without our wonderful workers.

Then came the horse and rider mileage awards, which I have always felt, are of equal if not greater importance than the yearly overall high point awards. It takes a lot of work and commitment to keep our horses (and ourselves!) in sound condition over the season and over the years, ride after ride and mile after mile. And, again, mileage awards are incremental, so if you didn't see your name this year it is probably because you have not quite reached the next level yet...just keep riding and you'll get there.

The year-end horse and rider standings are listed individually inside, but I would like once again to congratulate Jenny Smith and Ruby for their incredible season in Region 3: 1st place open heavyweight horse and 1st place open heavyweight horsemanship and winners of both the Ruth Tyree High Average Horsemanship and the Ken Burkdoll Combined High Average Horse and Rider Awards. What a fantastic team!

Another special award, the Susan Bretag Service Award, was presented to Dee Overholt for her exceptional service to the region this past year. On behalf of Judy Mason and myself, I would like to thank the Region 3 membership for recognizing the two of us with the National Appreciation Award from Region 3. It means a lot to me, more than I can say (and you know me, I am hardly EVER without words).

By the way, for those of you who cannot attend National Convention, the March/April newsletter will carry a listing of all Region 3 placings (which, by the way, are not just for the Open riders any more, but include high average Competitive Pleasure National awards and Open, CP, and Novice high point horse and rider regional team awards which are given by National).

The final event of the 2002 Region 3 Seminar was the annual vest auction, at which our members' enthusiasm is exceeded only by their generosity, and this year was no exception. I want to thank our talented and funny auctioneer, Steve Claypoole of Fruita, Colorado, for once again donating his time to run the auction. This year's auction raised \$7,960.00 for the region, and the first choice high bidders. Bill and Jenny Smith, donated a phenomenal \$4,450.00. At the conclusion of the bidding, I made a motion, which was later formally approved by the Region 3 Board, to recognize Bill and Jenny's generosity, past and present, by paying their base entry fees for the 2003 ride season. To the rest of you, who contributed the balance of \$3,510.00, we thank you also because, at a time when many organizations are experiencing financial problems, our membership continues to guarantee that we can remain solvent.

I am sorry for the scarcity of pictures from Convention; I asked people to send me pictures for the newsletter but hardly anyone did. I want to remind the membership at this, the beginning of another season, to please send me articles, letters, and photos for your newsletter. (I know I'm a good writer, but even my creativity gets overly stretched sometimes.)

I'm looking forward to seeing everybody at the rides in 2003. Please let me hear from you.

President's Message:

First, I would like to say thank you to the new board for electing me as president of Region 3 for the coming year. It was a pleasure to work with the board we had last year, and I am looking forward to working with the new board. I thought that the regional convention in Denver was a great success. The new board was seated and new officers elected. The first board meeting for the year was held. At the general meeting, the board announced that our long-time supply chair, Sue McKelvy, had decided not to continue in that position. I would like to say thank you to Sue for her long years of service and to thank and welcome Sue Peters who has volunteered to be the new supply chair.

At the convention we all had a good time. It was great to see everyone again after the long off-season. We had a very nice dinner and afterwards the regional awards presentations. A big congratulations to all the recipients; you worked hard for them and deserve them.

After the awards was the final event, the vest auction. This year's vest auction was a great monetary success; we raised \$7,960.00. The auction is a fun event and has become the single largest source of funds for the region even though in three out of the last four years none of the money raised in the auction has been spent; it all went into a reserve fund.

I am bringing this up because, as many of you may have already heard firsthand or through the grapevine, I personally had problems with what transpired during this year's vest auction.

As usual, the most spirited bidding was for Open first choice, and the Open first choice bid sold for \$4,450.00, which in my personal opinion, was an excessive amount of money to pay for a vest number. I understand that some of these bids are just ways to make a donation to the region, and in most cases I don't have a problem with this. But when you are talking about this much money, I feel that all parties should understand and be

clear about the transaction. Toward this end, I, acting as the president of the region, did not accept a check the next day from the high bidder. I wanted to be sure that, after a cooling off period, all parties involved still wanted to make the bid. During the cooling off period, I approached the rest of the Region 3 board about this situation and asked for their input. The original bid still stands and is being honored fully by the bidder.

I would like to stress that these actions were taken by me. If there are any recriminations or hard feelings from the membership about what I did, then I apologize for creating the situation (but in similar circumstances I would do the same thing again).

If the board or general membership feels that I overstepped my authority or compromised Region 3 by my actions in this situation, then I would be willing to step aside. But I would hope that, even if you don't agree with the actions taken, everyone can understand that I acted out of personal convictions and not in an effort to give anyone preferential treatment. Thank you for reading this and for allowing me to try and clarify the situation.

I look forward to seeing everyone at rides this year. Kathy and I just finished reviewing the Region 3 rides for this year in the wonderful ride book that Betty put together, and it looks like we will be riding or working at least nine of the eleven Region 3 rides.

I find it very disturbing to hear people yell at their horses and always call them bonehead, blockhead, dummy, witch, devil, etc. I wonder if this isn't a little like a self-fulfilling prophecy. I would suggest that, if we would have a more respectful attitude toward our horses, they might respond differently. I know that my neighbor lady drives a magnificently obedient pair of Morgans. Sitting next to her, you can hardly hear the commands she respectfully speaks to them, and they respond instantly.

I really don't know at what level horses communicate with each other. I am quite sure they do. When I bring Woody back from a weekend competition, the babies will each spend some time close to him, grazing by his side, as if they are getting the story, and so will his long-time friend Fog. My imagination? Maybe. I know they try very hard to communicate with us to show us what they want. They surely wish we were a little easier to communicate with. I know they pick up our emotions of nervousness, fatigue, fear, joyfulness, etc. Why not respect?

I was fascinated the other night by a special on the Horse Channel about the career of a world famous three-day event rider. People who were interviewed about the rider said that he could always get more out of a horse than anyone else could. A number of times, because of rider injuries, he was asked to ride these three-day event horses at major competitions just a few days before the competition. Sometimes he was not even able to get on the horses before the event. Usually he did extremely well and sometimes even won these major competitions on horses he had never ridden before. The interview with him about these rides was revealing. He said those horses were well trained and knew their business so he just tried to stay out of their way. That's pretty respectful!

I will confess that, in moments of weakness, I have called my wonderful horse Woody a "GOAT," and I have been heard yelling at the babies when they pull the water heater out of the tank right before my eyes, but this is not the picture I strive for. We often talk about how important it is for our horses to respect us, but there is also another direction this emotion should go. We should respect our horses. I believe it is a self-fulfilling prophecy. If you give them respectful and patient training, they will proudly respond to the best of their ability. Try it.

Minutes and Treasurer's Report were approved. Motion made and approved to donate \$300.00 to National for annual awards.

Resignation by Sue McKelvy as supply chair; Susan Peters volunteers to be the new supply chair for the region. Susan reported that Novice vest #115 and CP vest #40 need to be replaced. Betty will have the seamstress Mary Davis make new ones. Weight cards have been printed and will be distributed to all ride managers. The region needs new stethoscopes. Betty will check on prices through the nurse's office at her school.

Tracie Scarlett volunteered to host the 2003 benefit ride at Colorado Trail.

Discussion on next year's convention tabled until next Board meeting. It should probably be held on the Western Slope. It was decided that the split Competitive Pleasure division would not be continued. All riders in CP will compete in one class.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to give Rabbit Valley \$500 for campground improvement which will be coordinated with the BLM. Judy Mason and Terry Yates will also look into a grant through National and our National Board members will assist them.

Region 3 will also support the 2003 Championship Challenge with \$300 as it has done in the past.

Kris Cummings showed the board the new plaque for the Ruth Tyree award, which will allow the addition of more names. Doreen Portner reported that the mentor program went well for the first half of the year, then participation declined. Historian Janine Ancell reported that she had put ten new pages in and that the books will be on display. Betty Wolgram reported that the ride book is here and should

Betty Wolgram reported that the ride book is here and should not be distributed until after the awards banquet to keep the Ken Burkdoll winner a secret. Board members and ride management should take extra ride books. Ride books will be mailed to members not present at convention.

Approved that the minimum amount to purchase a vest at the auction will be \$20 for members present and \$30 later, proceeds will go to the General Fund.

Also, a rider who reaches five firsts (or, in the case of juniors, five firsts and 160 lifetime points) in the Novice horsemanship division during the 2003 ride year may continue to compete in the novice horsemanship division for the remainder of the 2003 ride season.



JUDGES FEEDBACK

At the recent Region 3 seminar, judges took the opportunity to meet and discuss concerns, problems, and suggestions that had been brought to their attention from various sources throughout the past year.

In an effort to give riders an avenue to communicate, the possibility of reinstating the rider critique sheet seemed advisable. We explored ways the critiques could be distributed, how the information could be collected and by whom, and how it would be communicated to those involved.

We are interested in the rides and in judges continuing to work toward consistent standards. Continuing education seemed a good idea. One suggestion was to hold judges' camp that would be fun as well as informative. The judges' film produced by NATRC also has many useful reminders. To facilitate the process of obtaining judges, we proposed notifying ride managers of dates and locations that we would be available to judge.

Receiving correct and consistent information before competing can help to alleviate the frustrations of many new riders. We encourage and participate in giving clinics.

Judges must meet criteria to qualify for eligibility, then test and train. Even then, they are provisional and scrutinized. Judges must also maintain eligibility. It is felt that those who compete make the best judges, as they keep in touch with the changes that are occurring in NATRC as well as understanding the practical points concerning horses, riders, and management.

It should be remembered that we became involved initially to spend time with our horses and to improve our skills. We love this sport and judge as a way to contribute.
