From the Editor's Desk:

We need to encourage and support their interest so that our region and sport can experience growth rather than stagnation. Try to make an effort at every ride to meet and talk to someone new. Let's welcome everyone to the NATRC family. Our primary purpose is to learn and to have fun with our horses and our friends, not to mention getting to ride all those beautiful trails. Ribbons are nice, but all the ribbons in the world can't equal the friendships and memories we gather over the years.

Cherishing those friendships and memories is also a way to avoid "competitive burnout." Last year when I decided to alternate riding two horses, I knew that I was relinquishing any chance for a year-end overall high point award, and I wondered if I might look back on the season with regret. The

(Reprint of Ken's Acceptance Speech at National Convention)

I have to give my wife Betty the credit for getting me interested in NATRC seven years ago. She suckered me into riding safety for a ride, and by the second day I was wishing I had entered.

I've learned that creating a true partnership with a horse, especially an alpha mare like Summer, is a real challenge. She gives me 100% effort every Ride, and I'm very proud that I've learned how to be her partner as well as being her leader.

POTPOURRI

FEBRUARY 13, 2003, NATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MINUTES HIGHLIGHTS

To keep you better informed, the regional newsletter is going to begin presenting a summary of National Board minutes. Complete minutes may be read when they are published in *Hoofprint*.

Jenny Smith was appointed a rider representative to the Judges' Committee. Priscilla Lindsey was appointed Horsemanship Co-Chair.

Of interest to ride management, the following guidelines regarding sanctions were adopted:

- A ride manager and/or ride management that does not pay all the required fees to NATRC and/or other organizations by the designated times may have the sanction revoked.
- b) The BOD or Executive Committee and Sanction Chairperson have the discretion to revoke the sanction to any ride that has substantial problems resulting from poor management (for example: timing and mileage consistently off, abuse of others disregard to safety, etc.)
- If sanction is revoked, ride manager must have written notification at least two weeks prior to ride date.
- d) If sanction is revoked, in conjunction with notification of the ride manager, Sanction Chair must also notify that region's National Directors, who will take action to notify riders.

As of May 1, ride insurance will be changing to a different carrier, although still administered by Equisure. Coverage will be through Lloyds of London. New insurance applications along with new rider and worker liability waivers will be sent to ride management. Both parents of junior riders and workers should be signing the waivers. Regions should purchase and post Equine Liability Act warning signs at rides in states which have these laws.

Bob Goulding has been appointed to replace Stephanie Ostrowski on the National Drug Advisory committee.

Doreen Portner presented Region 3 request to the Trail Committee for a trail grant for the Rabbit Valley staging area. Region 3 approved \$500 to help support hauling gravel and grading of parking area and is requesting an additional \$500 from NATRC to go to ride manager to distribute to BLM as needed for improvements to the camp staging area. Motion carried.

National Honorary & Appreciation Awards. Request that regions choose next year's nominees early and have write-ups to Carla Jo Bass for November meeting.

Convention 2004. Region 1 presented proposal to hold at same time, same place as AERC Convention. NATRC Convention will run concurrently, but not in conjunction with AERC Convention. Motion carried to hold 2004 NATRC National Convention at the Silver Legacy in Reno, Nevada, on February 26-28.

Championship Challenge 2002. Report given that ride had a profit of \$1,255.31 which will be split between Region 6 and National.

Championship Challenge 2003. Motion carried that rider fees be collected on Championship Challenge from 2003 on.

Fund Raising. Motion carried to appoint Jim and Lin Ward of Region 3 as Directors of Marketing to raise funds for NATRC with an annual budget of \$500.00.

CP high average awards discussion. Region 3 would like award to be based on points, not average. Region 3 feels the high average calculation discourages riders from doing more than six rides. Motion made and carried that present rules for high average awards remain the same.

Proposed guideline change – clarification of trail conduct. Motion carried to add to Guidelines regarding off trail riders the following:

"Off-Trail. If a rider does not return to the point where he/she went off-trail and the ride manager, the trail master, rules' interpreter and the judges determine an advantage was received, the horse and rider shall receive penalty points or be disqualified. Trail "make-up" is not an acceptable alternative to adjudicate missed trail or observation points."

Next National Board of Directors meeting will be held in Denver, Colorado, on July 12. (Summary by Betty Wolgram, Newsletter Editor)

ANOTHER WAY OF LOOKING AT IT ...
