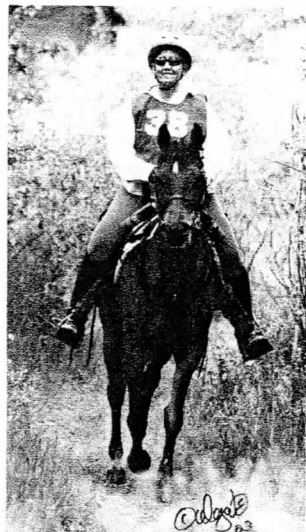

### Region III's President's Prescription... Kay Gunckel DVM

Some of you have probably not heard but my mare, Star, had orthopedic surgery to fuse her pastern joint on June 2nd. She had injured the right hind leg in an accident last September and was developing ring bone (arthritis) in the joint. She went into surgery with a 75% chance of returning to athletic soundness. Unfortunately her surgery did not go well. She will never be sound again. Her career in CTR is over. I'm thankful I still have her and hope she'll be a wonderful broodmare in the future.

This incident really got me thinking about why we all do this sport. It's not for the ribbons and trophies. It's not for the mileage or even the challenge of the obstacles. I am really going to miss that bond I have established with Miss Star over all the miles we worked together. The level of trust between a person and their horse takes years to develop. Yes, Star was a jiggy, anxious horse, that bucked me off last year, but she developed into a friend that I loved going down the trails with. When I had a tough week at work, all I had to do was saddle-up and go down a mountain trail with Star. I do some of my best thinking on the back of my horse. I am going to miss my time together with her in that way. We'll still see each other but it just won't be the same.

Yes, there will be other horses, but it will be years before that bond will be at the same level as I had with Star where we trusted each other and she responded to the slightest cue. I hope that each of you have experienced this bond with your horse. If not, keep working together, it is worth the time and effort! Happy Trails!

### Breed Award Guidelines for NATRC

The NATRC Breed Award program achieves several goals. One of those goals is to showcase the diverse breeds that compete and succeed in competitive trail. Another goal is to publicize our great sport to the many breed organizations so that their members can discover NATRC. In addition to our year-end awards, we will be highlighting breeds in each issue of HOOFPRIINT. We may re-visit some well-known breeds or introduce new ones.

If you have a story to tell about your horse, we would love to forward it to your breed organization for inclusion in one of their publications. Write up your tale and submit it to Kathy Brown [equine@newmex.com](mailto:equine@newmex.com) or P.O. Box 76, Taos, NM 87571. Please relate your story to your experience in NATRC and consent to it being edited as necessary. (Pictures of you and your horse in competition are great to include.)

Horses from all divisions (Novice, CP, and Open) are eligible for year-end National Breed Awards IF all of the following criteria are met:

- 1) The horse must have been ridden by a current member of NATRC.
- 2) The horse must have completed at least 3 rides in it's designated Region, except for Region 1A (Alaska) where one ride is required.
- 3) The horse's registration with it's breed organization must be current AND all breed organization criteria must be met.

#### Frequently Asked Questions:

**How do my horse's points get reported?** When you complete a ride entry form, you are asked for your horse's breed and registration number if any. You must also provide a copy of your horse's registration papers at every ride. Once the ride is completed, the information is forwarded to National NATRC. NATRC submits the top five horses in each breed to the breed organization. It is the Breed Organization's decision, not NATRC's, regarding the approval of an award and the eligibility of the recipient. It is your responsibility to check with your horse's breed organization as to criteria to be considered and met.

**What if my horse is double or triple registered?** You must decide which breed your horse will compete under for the ride year and stick with that choice.

**Why are some awards extravagant and others very simple?** The choice of awards is up to each Breed Organization, not NATRC. Some organizations are more financially able to provide prizes than others or perhaps their funds are focused in other areas. Whether you receive an embroidered jacket or a paper certificate you have to feel proud of your horse as it is the top competitor in its breed in all of NATRC!

**"Grade" or unregistered horses are the biggest Breed category in NATRC.** Efforts are made annually to locate private sponsorship of an award for these great competitors. You can check the standing of your horse at year-end by referencing NATRC's website, [www.natrc.org](http://www.natrc.org). Please remember that even if your horse is listed on the website, it may not receive an award as this decision is made by each breed organization. Information can be verified correct as posted and corrections can be made with Kathy Brown within a specified amount of time before it is forwarded to your horse's Breed Organization.

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## The Message Board

From the Editor:

As a former CTR manager, I know first-hand the special frustrations in dealing with the USFS or BLM, not to mention the state and local governmental agencies who manage the lands we traverse on horseback. These problems must be aired and National NATRC made aware of the glitches the local government offices cause when a CTR is being planned and executed.

Among my pet peeves was the inconsistencies of fee structures, with some offices of USFS charging a flat-fee, others requesting a start-up fee with 5% of gross (not net) revenues received! Some agencies dictate what trails can not be traveled even if those same trails are open without restriction to horse use. I've yet to note anything gained from the fees they collected such as horse-specific campsites.

Matt Baker's suggestion (Stirrup Newsletter, May/April) for raising funds earmarked for specific use by the above-mentioned agencies seems to be a good one. I'd be happy to pay extra to license my trailer if I knew the trails would be available and facilities improved or created for our sport.

Our rides usually consist of 2 1/2 day's use of a compact area out of 365! Campsites used by NATRC competitors are usually left cleaner than when we set them up. Often ride managers work on trails to clear them of dangerous debris, create waterbars for erosion control, and clean up trash prior to and after the actual competition. NATRC provides funds for special projects such as site improvements for some rides such as Rabbit Valley CTR.

We've proven to be good stewards in our use of our public lands but somehow the message seems to be missed by the governments!

## Heads Up! by Susie Witter

According to the Maverick Press, April 2004, an article on Legal Considerations states the **AGRICULTURAL IMMUNITY LAW** (House Bill 03-1003) took effect on 7/1/03. It provides protection to landowners and others who conduct activities on rural land such as trail rides, brandings, recreational cattle gatherings, etc. Combined with the Equine Activity Statute which addresses the liability of equine professionals and others as well as the equine activity sponsors, Susie suggests we might need a "layman's" interpretation of these laws from a lawyer.

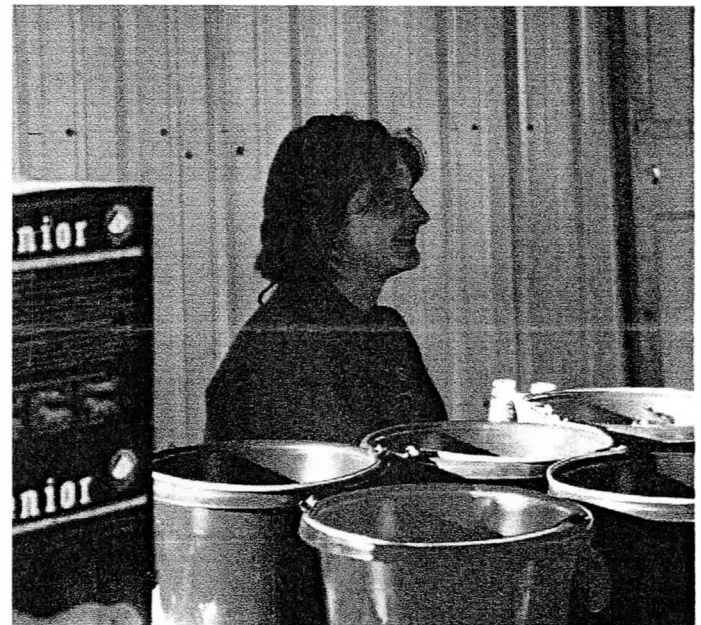
### Fuel Prices Rising...Cooperative Trailering?

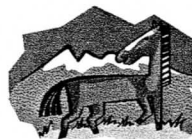
## Horse Expo Report Linell Miller

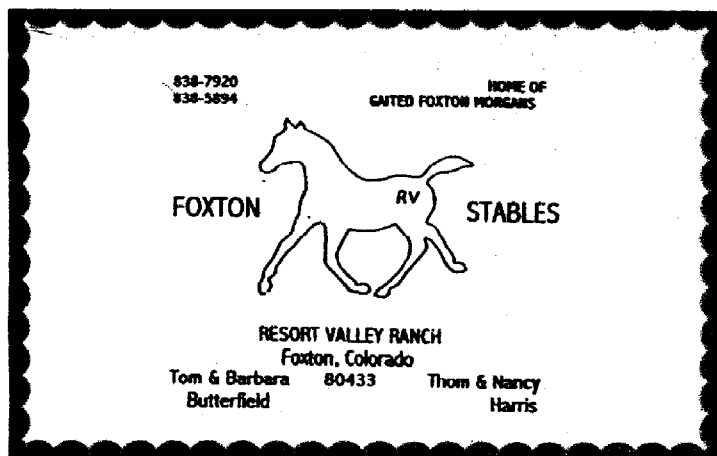
In March/April 2003, the American Horse Council, of which NATRC is a member, upon the recommendation of its Recreation Committee, signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the U.S. Forest Service. The memorandum created a partnership between the U.S. Government and the private sector to accomplish mutual goals.

## Trail News...continued....

The Memorandum of Understanding established a more formal AHC relationship with the USFS. It encourages the USFS to identify appropriate partnership opportunities in which the AHC and its member organizations may participate, to make public lands available to horsemen and women, and to work with the AHC to identify and pursue funding opportunities for facilities, trail improvement and maintenance from non-federal sources. One thing which works well, is to write letters to the appropriate governmental agencies and personnel. Letters should be short, to the point and probably sent via e-mail, if possible. Navajo Lake and Chokecherry Canyon CTR trails and campsites are prime examples of what a compaign of letter writing can do. We need letters to go to the local USFS supervisors expressing our displeasure about difficulties we are encountering with them in staging a competitive trail ride.

Problems that continue despite the above-mentioned Memorandum of Understanding need to be addressed. The public lands are ours to enjoy whether we are on horseback, foot or bike. Make your voice heard!

Our condolences to Lee and Lois Hoth for the loss of Chico, a retired roping horse, used recently as a "babysitter".

## Something to Think About from Carol Fredal:

Regarding rules of a person's campsite at rides, she states they are made to keep you and their horses safe. She says that horses are away from their familiar locations and are "on guard". The space near them is crucial and that riders who walk their horses too close risk being kicked.

She also cites the care necessary for tying your horse at a proper length with a quick release knot...too long and the horse can hang up a leg, or worse, wrap the lead rope around it's leg. She suggests that buckets be secured so that they don't go flying from a kick or "bang" all night to the annoyance of neighboring campers.

Blanketing our horses is often necessary at our rides but be certain the blanket straps are at the proper length and not too long so as to hang up a hoof when the horse lies down and then scrambles to his feet.

Trailer tack room doors need to be kept closed to keep horses from mooching into grain or other contents stored there.

Riders who don't consider these issues for safety not only endanger themselves, they put other horses and people at risk. Carol thinks judges should check campsites on Friday night so that potential problems can be identified and eliminated
